PLANTS FROM THE POLYTUNNEL/ GREENHOUSE

If you are short of time or space to start your seeds off at home, our team of dedicated volunteers have been hard at work doing the seed sowing for you. Over the next few months, weather permitting of course, there will be a wide variety of plants for sale whenever the trading centre is open.

The first to be available, if we continue with our mild weather conditions, will be broad beans, cabbages and lettuce.

The team are growing a wide variety of tomatoes this year, ready to be potted on are Gardener's delight, Brandy wine, an heirloom cultivar of tomato, with large potato-leaved foliage and pink beefsteak-shaped fruit. It is popularly considered among the best tasting available. Marmande also beefsteak, Tigerella, a bi-coloured cultivar, relatively small, 2 to 4 ounces (60-120 g) early cropping and has a sweet flavour. Roma, a versatile and flavourful variety that is ideal for sauces and preserving. Money maker, cordontype tomatoes, meaning they require pruning to encourage optimum growth. Also, there will be blight resistant tomatoes but these have been sown a little later.

Cabbage, Golden acre, good for coleslaw, Filderkraut, a pointed headed variety with a high sugar content. A coreless point, making it very easy to cut fine shreds to make sauerkraut and Greyhound, an old favourite, flavoursome, neat and compact. Brussel sprouts, Cauliflowers, Leeks, Onions, Celery, Swiss chard, Calabrese, Purple sprouting broccoli, Aubergine, Beetroot, Sweet peppers, and a variety of chilli peppers, including the hot and pungent Tabasco variety.

All plants will be sold at competitive prices and we would encourage you to come and purchase from outside the trading centre which is open every Saturday am & pm, Sunday am.

The polytunnel team also grow all the plants for the Food bank plot, which is turning out to be a most productive enterprise to help local people who have fallen on hard times. If you have any spare plants to spare please consider donating them for this good cause.

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JOBS TO DO IN APRIL

VEGETABLE CARE:

Control weeds with regular hoeing to keep them down.

Plant out your chitted main-crop potatoes, either in deep drills or individual planting holes, with 5cm of soil mounded over the top. Alternatively, plant them through slits in black polythene and mulch.

Start earthing up your early potatoes, covering the shoots with *fleece* if frosts threaten.

Feed spring cabbage with a *nitrogen feed*; remove any mouldy or yellowed leaves to prevent the spread of fungal diseases.

Growmore is a balanced fertiliser for trees and shrubs, sprinkle round the root area, then hoe in.

Aphids can multiply rapidly during mild spells. Remove early infestations by hand to prevent the problem getting out of hand.

Support pea plants with sticks, twigs, green support mesh, or wire netting.

Prepare runner bean supports for sowing (in May) or planting out (in June).

Sow a seedbed of brassicas to provide transplants of sprouting broccoli, cauliflowers and cabbages for planting out in June or July.

Transplant broad beans grown in pots.

Plant shallots, onion sets and garlic. Cover with either *fleece or environ mesh* to prevent the Allium Leaf Miner beetle. If you suffered from this pest last year do not grow your crop in the same area.

HELPING POLLINATORS

Aim to have plants that are attractive to pollinating insects in early spring to late autumn. **Never** use pesticides on plants in flower. An abundance of pollinators ensures plants continue to reproduce through seed; mixing flowers with vegetables and fruit such as apples, tomatoes and strawberries helps successful fruit cropping. Herbs are extremely beneficial for allotment growing, loved by bees, hoverflies and butterflies, they can also be used for companion planting as well as culinary use. Try growing: borage, chives, lavender, hyssop, comfrey, sage, dill, fennel, summer savory, rosemary, parsley and thyme. Mint, best contained within a pot as the roots spread.

FRUIT CARE:

Protect fruit blossom from late frosts by covering the trees with *fleece*. Hand-pollinate the flowers with a fine brush if insects are scarce.

Net your fruit crops to reduce pigeon/parrakeet damage and to keep birds off fruit buds (particularly gooseberries). Remove nets once flowering starts.

It is now safe to prune plum and cherry trees, if pruned in the colder months these trees are vulnerable to silver leaf.

Look out for our bees, avoid using insecticides on crops in flower. When carrying out any spraying operation do be careful to spray early in the morning when fewer pollinating insects are about.

Remove tied on grease bands from fruit trees.

De-blossom strawberries planted after September in their first year to help establishment. Ventilate strawberries under cloches and mulch with straw or mats.

Top Tips: Don't grow onions close to beans. Do grow celery next to beans for a bumper crop of beans. Plant French marigolds (Tagetes) with cabbages to discourage whitefly. Don't forget to plant a single petunia in the onion patch. Grow beans with your sweetcorn. Beans fix nitrogen from the air in their root nodules and sweetcorn loves nitrogen.

SEEDS TO SOW IN HEAT

Courgettes, Marrows, Pumpkins, Squash, Melons. Cucumbers, French & runner beans in pots, Peppers, Sweetcorn, Outdoor tomatoes.

SOW OR PLANT OUTDOORS

Beetroot, Leeks, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Carrots, Cauliflower, Lettuce, Radish, Swiss Chard, Perpetual Spinach, Kohl Rabi, Turnips, Main-crop Peas, Main-crop Potatoes, Spring Onions. Plant Asparagus Crowns, Sweet Peas

All our seeds are sold for a minimum of 25% off.

My favourite months are March and April when we reach a milestone in the turning of the seasons with the equilux. This arrived on March 17th when 12 hours of daylight matched 12 hours of nighttime and hours are running at their fastest rate of the year, increasing by about four minutes a day.
